

GET TO KNOW MILVERTON



25 MINUTES TO STRATFORD | 20 MINUTES TO LISTOWEL | 42 MINUTES TO KITCHENER 60 MINUTES TO GUELPH | 1 HOUR 50 MIN TO TORONTO | 1 HOUR 15 MIN TO LONDON

Originally known as West's Corners, the name of the village was changed to Milverton in 1871- reportedly named after a town in Somerset, England. With the arrival of the Stratford and Huron Railway in 1877, Milverton's agriculturally based industry expanded and the community began to thrive with a population of about 550. Today, the community of approximately 1800 residents is known for it's rich history, friendly locals and beautiful natural surroundings.
